**Women pleads guilty to 36 counts of tax fraud
and three Rio Rancho residents are indicted for tax evasion.**

SANTA FE – An Albuquerque woman pleaded guilty on March 5, 2005 to 36 counts of tax fraud. The New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department's Tax Fraud Investigations Division, which oversees tax fraud cases for the department, brought forth the charges against Gayle G. McIntyre.

"We're pleased that our investigation has resulted in a conviction for tax fraud and that restitution will be made to the state," said Alvan Romero, Director of the Tax Fraud Investigations Division (TFID), "Our role is to ensure that the state collects every dollar that belongs to taxpayers."

Under the plea agreement, McIntyre, a former New Mexico Taxation and Revenue Department employee agreed to pay the state, \$129,933.00 in restitution. She will be sentenced in the First Judicial District Court in Santa Fe, on April 11, 2005.

In addition to McIntyre, Patrick J. Youngman and Dana A. Youngman of Rio Rancho were each indicted on March 5, 2003 of three counts to evade or defeat taxes; a fourth degree felony. Each face a fine of not less than ten thousand dollars or imprisonment of not less than one year - and no more than five years.

Also indicted on March 5, 2005, was Paul R. Proefrock of Rio Rancho on three counts to evade or defeat taxes: a fourth degree felony. He faces a fine of not less than ten thousand dollars or imprisonment of not less than one year - and no more than five years. All three Rio Rancho residents, were indicted in the Thirteenth Judicial District Court in Sandoval County.

Both the Youngmans and Proefrock were indicted based on an investigation by the department's Tax Fraud Investigations Division.
