More than \$6 million in 2022 rebates available in unclaimed property 2022 checks returned to Tax and Rev are awaiting rightful owners

SANTA FE — More than \$6 million worth of 2022 tax rebates that were returned to Taxation and Revenue as undeliverable by the postal service have been turned over to the Department's Unclaimed Property office.

Taxpayers can search the Department's Unclaimed Property database for missing 2022 rebates, as well as any other unclaimed property that might belong to them. Searching and filing a claim is easy at nmclaims.unclaimedproperty.com.

Taxpayers who never received their 2023 rebates should reach out to the Department at nm.rebates@tax.nm.gov.

Taxation and Revenue has about 11,500 rebate checks from 2023 that were returned to the Department by the postal service as undeliverable. Those can still be delivered to the proper taxpayers once the Department has updated mailing addresses. Taxpayers can update their addresses by creating an account at <u>tap.state.nm.us</u> or by submitting <u>Form RPD-41260</u>. The form is available in the Personal Income Tax folder on the Forms & Publications page at tax.newmexico.gov.
